

Using Up Scraps #2 with Vikki MacDonald


Scrap Quilt #1

If you have a lot of strips hanging around this is the perfect quilt for you!




2. Sew strips into 15½" blocks then square them to 15".





3. Place two of these squares with right sides together with the direction of the strips horizontal in one square and vertical in the other.

 Sew around all four edges with a ¼" seam allowance.




Cut the completely sewn squares diagonally in half in both directions, creating four squares.



Place your four new squares in a pleasing arrangement and you have a quilt. Voila!

Scrap Quilt #2



- Collect scraps in a coordinating colour scheme.
- 2. Cut your scraps into 3" x 5½" rectangles (to finish at 2½" x 5")
- 3. Create rows of these rectangles
- 4. Insert 5½" x 15½" rectangles of one colour in a pleasing arrangement.
- Decorate that block with crests, buttons, decals, etc. if you wish.



Strategies

A collection of all the "Taking the Mystery Out Of..." block strategies presented at guild since 2011, have been kindly compiled for me by Kathy Bissett. They look fantastic now that they are all computerized and put into colour. At the February meeting, sample copies will be available for perusing. 

Carol Seeley Workshop Details

The following workshops are designed to build consecutively but are also valid and enjoyable as stand-alone classes.

Portions of the descriptions were provided by Carol Seeley.

Thursday, April 21 - 'Seascape'

Create a small quilted seascape while learning fabric selection to create visual depth, as well as Carol's special pieced appliqué construction method. Both machine and hand construction will be demonstrated. Your choice of one of three patterns will be provided. An overview of pattern development and further embellishment ideas will be discussed. Sewing machines will be required only for those wishing to use machine construction. Additional kit fee: \$2.

Level: All skill levels



Friday, April 22

Landscape Embellishments - Basic

A simple landscape can take on an authentic look with a



few simple surface embellishments. Explore these basic techniques that Carol uses in her landscape quilts. With a

simple landscape prepared before class (or in Thursday's workshop), create the illusion of water movement and shading with tulle and thread. Then learn the machine embroidery process for creating textured trees on your islands from far away to close up. Finally create a passing sailboat while learning the basic thread painting process. A sewing machine with zigzag capability is required.

Additional kit fee: \$3.

For those not taking Workshop 1, a simple pattern will be provided for preparation prior to this course, or you may create your own design (8"x14" is suggested).

Level: all Levels

Saturday, April 23

Landscape Embellishments - Intermediate

Note – if you have not taken Friday's class, you will need some basic experience with free motion stitching.

The day will be spent exploring thread painting and all it can do to create texture on your quilt surface. All embellishments will be made separately from the piece and applied after the top is quilted; therefore no pre-class work is necessary. Workshop includes lacy thread painting with tulle and confetti to create realistic boughs, bushes and trees. Also included is fine thread painting of detailed imagery such as a whale or eagle. Processes for creating a waterfall, and a 3D tree trunk will be demonstrated. The background pattern to build Whale Passage (pictured here) will be provided but no time will be spent in class on its actual construction since this is an embellishment class

only.



- 1. The Relief Sale Committee has been offered a booth at the Creativ Festival in Mississauga on Friday, April 22nd and Saturday, April 23rd. We will be hanging some of the quilts that are destined for the quilt auction as well as offering information about the New Hamburg Mennonite Relief Sale. We have been asked to set up a quilt for hand quilting and invite some people who would come and quilt. Visitors to the festival would be invited to pick up a needle and join the quilting. If there would be 4 quilters willing to come each day, those of us who are there representing the quilt committee could take turns quilting and give you an opportunity to check out the other booths. Your admission to the festival would be covered.
- 2. Each year during the Quilt and Fibreart Festival in May, the WCQG is asked to set up a quilt at Joseph Schneider Haus and supply quilters who would come to quilt it. Many of you have enjoyed these days. There is always a delicious lunch provided and good conversation around the quilt. Is there someone who would be willing to organize this activity? - 3. This year is the New Hamburg Mennonite Relief Sale's 50th annual sale and quilt auction. There are many special activities being planned to celebrate this milestone. Volunteers Needed Quilt Canada 2016

Volunteers are essential to making Quilt Canada 2016 an amazing show for Canadian and international quilters! There are hundreds of volunteer opportunities for you to select from and a wide variety of roles including "white glovers", greeters, front desk jobs, classroom/lecture angels, set up and take down teams, assisting with judging the National Juried Show and the "jack-of-all-trades."

How to Sign Up - Each volunteer must submit a volunteer sign up form. Positions are assigned on a first come, first served basis.

Most of the roles are 2 hour shifts. Longer shifts are available for set up and take down, classroom/lecture angels and floater roles. CQA/ACC greatly appreciates volunteers who sign up for multiple shifts on a single day or multiple days.

Some roles require physical exertion. Most roles require you to be on your feet. There are a few front desk roles that are sitting at a table.

Here is a short summary of the volunteer roles:

Set Up and Take Down: There are a number of different tasks involved in set up and take down. In addition to hanging the quilts, volunteers are needed to help vendors unload and load and to set up and take down classrooms and to take down quilts.

Registration: You will welcome visitors, distribute conference packages and answer visitor questions.

Front Desk/Admissions: Roles include greeting visitors, answering questions, selling tickets, applying wristbands, handing out guides, checking tickets at the door and signing in volunteers.

Hostess/Host/White Glove: The primary responsibility of "white glovers" is to ensure visitors do not touch the quilts. You will also answer questions about the quilts and the show.

Classroom/Lecture Angels: This role assists teachers and students in one of the 14 different classes/ lectures each day of the show. Tasks include assisting the teacher with set up, distributing materials, resolving any problems and straightening up the classroom at the end of the day.

Floaters/Jack of All Trades: You will step in whenever and wherever an extra set of hands is needed either for a short period or a full shift.

Aides & Scribes for NJS Judging: In this role you provide support to the judges as they evaluate the quilts. Scribes must be able to take legible dictation quickly and accurately. Aides must be able to hold up quilts for the judges to view. Preference will be given to individuals enrolled in the judging programs.

Volunteers Needed Quilt Canada 2016 (continued)

Benefits:

- If you volunteer for at least 4 hours on any single day, you receive free admission on that day.
- If you volunteer at least 4 hours on set up day, Tuesday June 14, you will receive free admission for one day of the show.
- If you volunteer for take down, Saturday June 18, you will receive free admission for that day.
- Classroom/Lecture Angels who work a full day receive lunch on that day and a free admission for another day.

Other important information for volunteers:

- Please arrive at least 30 minutes prior to your scheduled time for any last minute orientation and to ensure a smooth transition between volunteer shifts.
- Food services are available. Outside food is not allowed in the venue.
- You may want to bring a water bottle.
- Parking is free.
- Wear comfortable shoes.
- A volunteer room is available for you to use.
