## January 16, 2013

Happy New Year! We'll begin 2013 with a presentation called "Baker's Dozen". Three guild members will be showing and speaking about 13 of their quilts: Elizabeth Schneider, Dorothy Holdenmeyer, and Joan Doke.

We'll also have a Baker's Dozen Strip Exchange: bring 13, take 13. Everyone is welcome to participate! Please bring 13 strips that are $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide, and selvedge-to-selvedge long (i.e. across the full width of fabric off the bolt, about 40 " $-42^{\prime \prime}$ ). The fabric should be good quality $100 \%$ cotton. The strips can be all the same fabric (ideally) or a variety. Drop them off at the beginning of the meeting at the program committee table, and pick up your new set at the end of the meeting.

Our vendor this month is Sew Little Time from Cambridge.

## Looking ahead

Saturday February 2: Make a very easy Jelly Roll 1600 quilt on from 1-5pm at the Mannheim Community Centre. Doors open at 12:30. If you want to see how fast you can sew it up, be ready to start sewing at 1:00 and you will be timed. Who knows... will you be the first one finished? "Racing" is completely optional however. Just come for a afternoon of sewing and you will be surprised how quickly you can make this quilt. You will need to bring 1 jelly roll (40 strips that are $21 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 40 "-42^{\prime \prime}$ ). There is no cost, but please register by signing up at the program committee table.

Remember this challenge only goes to February! (The reason is that quilters are honest people...how refreshing to hear this truth!)

## Taking the Mystery Out of the Kaleidoscope Quilt

This traditional quilt block is made with an isosceles triangle template (an isosceles triangle has two sides of the same length). For the kaleidoscope the angle between these sides is 45 degrees. The template provided results in an 8 -inch block. The height (from the point of the 45 degree angle to the base) of the triangle is 4 ".
To create a different sized block you can lengthen or shorten the equal sides of the triangle on either side of the 45 degree angle, making sure that they remain equal and the 45 degree remains true.

You need 8 triangles for each block to form the octagons. They should be alternating with contrasting relative values of dark and light. Make as many octagons as you need for your quilt top and divide them into two piles, $A$ and $B$.

Next add four corners to each octagon as illustrated below. Please note that in this version of the Kaleidoscope Quilt all corners are light.


## Block A

Sew light corners to the dark triangles.


Block B
Sew light corners to the light triangles.


Assemble the completed blocks alternating $A$ and $B$ as illustrated:


Circles wonderfully emerge if the colour is correctly placed.

These templates are for an 8-inch kaleidoscope quilt block. The dotted lines are cutting lines.
