As with any volunteer organization, the activities and events of the guild are only made possible by members stepping up to the plate and helping out wherever possible.



Smile Quilt Bee Day - April 2010

Chocolate Chip Cookies - From Chef at Home by Michael Smith

- 1 ½ cups all purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon Cocoa powder
- 1 tablespoon Corn syrup
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup chocolate chips

Preheat over to 375°
Soft and Chewy – 12 minutes
Crispy and Crunchy - 15 minutes

Steps:

- #1 Stir together flour, cocoa, baking powder, salt
- #2 Separate bowls use mixer cream butter and sugar then add corn syrup, egg, vanilla combine well
- #3 gradually add flour mixture to #2
- #4 Stir in chocolate chips
- #5 Drop by teaspoon onto lightly greased cookie sheet or parchment covered
- #6 Bake see above
- #7 Cool, eat, enjoy!

We wanted to take this opportunity to thank you for the beautiful quilt our daughter received during her stay at the pediatric unit of Grand River Hospital.

Our daughter was injured during a hockey game as she plays for the Kitchener Lady Rangers. She was on a break away and was hit very hard from behind into the boards, feet first. She had a very severe fracture of her Tibia and Fibula.

This fracture required 2 surgeries, 21 screws and 2 plates.

Our daughter is 16 years of age and in grade 11. She has missed 1 month of school and is finally attending school in a wheel chair as she is non-weight bearing. The past month has been a very traumatic ordeal for a young teen.

When the hospital presented her with one of your beautiful quilts, we were astonished. My daughter had been enduring a lot of pain and was so surprised that it brought immediate comfort to her when we wrapped her in it.

Just knowing that someone made this comforter to help someone through a traumatic situation brought tears to our eyes. Please know that what you are doing is amazing, you are creating keepsakes for children to remind them that people care and are compassionate.

Thank you again for all of your hard work that goes into making these quilts. This is a real act of caring from the heart.


You'll lie there in an empty house in pain & deep despair,

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
Summer Stashbuster 2010

Designed and created by Lisa VanGalon, January 2010

This quilt started as a UFO donated in January. As I was trying to find a way to stretch the squares I received, I developed the following quilt. I have included two options for the patch blocks. Option 1 will use up smaller pieces. Use Option 2 detailed at the bottom to make the straight patches if you are looking for a quicker project.

Option 1: Split patches: Using 2 1/5" strips, sew together the following:

Piece 1: 2 %" by 2 %" dark strip to a 4 %" by 2 %" light strip Piece 2: 3 %" by 2 %" dark strip to a 3 %" by 2 %" light strip Piece 3: 4 %" by 2 %" dark strip to a 2 %" by 2 %" light strip




Sew together to make a 6 %" by 6 %" block like Image 1:

For twin size, prepare 48 patch blocks, for a double, prepare 64 patch blocks, for a queen, prepare 72 patch blocks.

Cut white/light fabric in 6 ½" by 6 ½" blocks. You will need 1 1/3 yards for twin, 1 5/6 yards for a double, 2 yards for a queen.

Take one patch block and one light block and pin right sides together. Mark diagonally to prepare to sew half square triangles. If using split patches, be sure to mark the sewing line from the 4 %" strip to the 4 %" strip. See Image 2. Sew the %" seams on either side of the marked cutting line. Cut as marked and press open seams toward the patch blocks.



Cut solid/coordinating fabric in 6 %" by 6 %" squares. You will need 96 blocks for twin (2 2/3 yards), 144 blocks for queen (4 yards).

Take one ¼ square triangle block and one solid/coordinating block and pin right sides together. Mark the cutting line for half square triangles from white to patch to split the triangles. Cut and press open seams to the solid side.

Center each block and trim to 5 %" by 5 %".

Arrange blocks into a pinwheel pattern. Alternate your blocks so that the patch triangles are to the outside for block 1 (Image 3) and to the inside for block 24 (Image 4). Finished block size is 10~%" by 10~%". Alternate your starting block as you build your rows.





Image 3 (Block 1)

If using split patches, arrange your block 2 triangles as shown in

Image 5 (Block 2B)

I plan to use 3" borders with no other sashing.

Total pinwheel blocks needed: Twin size – 48 pinwheels, double – 64 pinwheels, queen –72 plnwheels

Option 2: Straight patches: Using 2 %" strips, sew any three strips together and cut to make 6 %" by 6 %" blocks. Use these blocks in place of the split blocks shown in Option 1.
