Presidents' Meanderings . . .

A sampler quilt tells a story of a woman's life. Each block is dissimilar and represents a distinct story, a different pattern. Originally, young girls usually made samplers as a teaching project. By making their mistakes in the various blocks on their sampler, they were able to learn and then go on—perhaps to do an entire quilt in the block they had just mastered.

As early as age four, little girls began practising their stitches. Holding a delicate needle in their tiny, clumsy fingers, they pieced together simple four-patch blocks of plain and flowered calicoes. In my grandmother's journal, she writes, "Before I was three years old, I was started at piecing a quilt. Patchwork, you know. My stint was at first only two blocks a day, but these were sewn together with the greatest of care or they were unraveled and done over." By the time young women were about to be married, the needle had become their constant companion and they took great pride in the accomplished needlework of their quilts.

Traditionally, in an Amish girl's life, twelve quilt tops were to be finished before a girl's engagement. She was never to start her thirteenth quilt until after her betrothal was officially announced. Then her bridal quilt was planned and executed, usually by close friends and family of the bride.

I found it interesting to explore the word *quilt*. This word is derived from the Latin *culcita*, which literally means "a stuffed sack". What do your stuffed sacks say about your life, your values, and your priorities?

A relative living on the Prairies wrote my grandmother in Neustadt, Ontario, in the late 1800's. In the letter, she expressed her thoughts about her quilts. "I make them warm to keep my family from freezing; I make them beautiful to keep my heart from breaking."

I see parables—stories—in the old quilts. They tell of values, patience, and timeless meanings. They draw the person in. They speak of comfort and rest. They soothe with the gentleness of a mother's kiss.

We all quilt for different reasons. One woman quilts and begins to gather a sense of wholeness from the fragments of her life. Another quilts to help mend the world's brokenness. Still another woman takes up her needle to hand a legacy of warmth and love to her children—a legacy that will continue into the next generation and the next. However, one thing abides—when the project is finished, there is a whole where there once were only parts. This is tremendously satisfying to the quilter...enjoy your stitching!

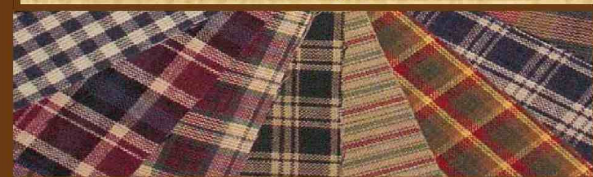

More Facts about Our Guild (1997 to 2002)

1997 - "W.C.Q.G. Quiltfest '97" was held in St. Agatha. "Birds of a Feather" was the raffle quilt, which went on to win Best Guild Quilt Award at the Ontario Juried Quilt Show at the K-W Art Gallery.

1998 - In March, Edna Keown and four other women started a quilting group at Grand Valley Institute for Women. The inmates proudly donated their first project to the New Hamburg Relief Sale. Kathleen Bissett won the Dorothy McMurdie Award at the General Meeting of the CQA/ACC in Vancouver. The award goes to an individual who has made a significant contribution to Canadian quilt making. W.C.Q.G. began making Smile Quilts. We began to hold both afternoon and evening meetings.

April 2000 - The Guild's web site was launched thanks to the extraordinary efforts of Jamie and Jan Hember. Ours was one of the first web sites available for quilters.

2002 - A contest was held to find a new name for our guild newsletter, then known as, "Waterloo County Quilters' Guild Newsletter". "Scraps of Wisdom", submitted by Sue Bailey, was chosen.

Any scrap fabrics can be used along with the fabric provided. They don't have to match; in fact, it is best if they don't. The blocks are foundation pieced but can be sewn by hand or machine. If you picked up a crazy-patch block kit for the Rag Coat Project at the February Guild meetings, please return the completed block to the March meetings and check off your name on the list. The stories will be included in a booklet to accompany the coat. The owners of the fabrics will be identified by first name only.
