Presidents Message



"Practice makes perfect!" How many times have we heard that phrase? Believing there is some merit to the idea, Judy and Sally have graciously allowed me to practice writing this column in preparation for my turn as President next year.

Speaking of practice, my mind boggled at April speaker, Helen Fujiki's statement that she did 1,000 hours of practice at machine quilting before she began to develop her design and piecing style. It certainly showed - her machine quilting beautifully enhances her fusion quilt designs. Contrast that with the approach of Dwayne Wanner, March's

talented speaker. Dwayne relies largely on improvisation in the design and execution of his quilt art. No thousand hours of practice for Dwayne - he just sits down at his machine and does it! Dwayne's designs are spontaneous - you get what ever happens- while Helen's are carefully planned to convey a message. Helen relies on both centuries old (broderie perse) and modern (fusible appliqué) techniques to achieve her artistic vision. Dwayne, on the other hand, uses formal quilting technique only where it adds to his vision (in the piping inserts or binding), preferring abstraction to the restriction of formal techniques and rules.

For all their differences, though, these talented quilt artists have much in common - wonderful use of colour, a sense of balance in their designs, a love of quilting as a form of creative expression. Most of us, I venture, fall somewhere in between Helen and Dwayne in our approach to our own quilt making. Few of us have the patience, dedication and drive it takes to dedicate 1,000 hours to one aspect of our quilting. On the other hand, few of us possess the confidence and bravery it takes to completely improvise our projects. Isn't it wonderful that we have chosen a craft that welcomes and appreciates diversity?

Our guild is the perfect example of diversity. We are fortunate to have members who can only be called master quilters, having spent years of practice to perfect their skills; we are also lucky to have "newbies", those who are willing to include us in their quilting journey. Then, there are those who fall somewhere in between - having had enough practice to see a glimmer of perfection in this project, trying a new technique to see a spark of hope in that project. Whether you are working on your first quilt or your fiftieth, whether you devote hours to practice or prefer the Nike method (Just Do It!), our guild is a place where your work is appreciated and encouraged; a place where practice makes perfect, but perfection is not required; a place where good quilting friends provide the support and inspiration we all need as our journeys progress.

I am honoured to be a member of this quilting community.

Often members make a special quilt for a family member or friend living out of town or wish to send a quilt to a show far from home. A company in north Waterloo called Packaging Too will custom-make boxes to your specifications. Turn-around time is short and the price seems reasonable to me. The company is located at 40 Frobisher Drive; telephone 519-746-3099; open 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday; closed

Saturday and Sunday. The company also carries all sorts of packing supplies.

African Quilt Project

At the last Guild meeting I introduced another project. The goal is to make a quilt for the Mennonite Relief Sale in New Hamburg. Last year my husband and I went with a small group on a learning tour to Kenya and Tanzania. We saw a lot and learned a lot. I did come home with fabric and batik panels. In the back of my mind I had an idea to make another quilt. Finally I think I have come up with an idea that will work and get many people involved. This quilt will consist of many small quilts, sewn together in the quilt as you go method.

Each participant will be asked to make a small quilt, quilted but not bound. Sizes would be 20 by 16 inches and 12 by 16 inches. On each quilt the left and the bottom would have a 3 inch strip, what can be pieced, appliquéd or a solid piece of fabric. This should be darker that the rest, so it will give the appearance of a partial border. The rest would be your canvas. Silhouettes, appliquéd people or animals, small batik pieces etc all could be used.

I would like to start after our guild show is over. My home would be open in October and November for workshops, working days, whatever is necessary. You are welcome to look at that time through my fabrics. Once I have an idea of how much interest there is, I will set dates.

Due date would be the Guild meeting in January.

London International Quilt Festival will have African Quilts this year.

They also offer some very interesting workshops.

There will also be a merchant mall with vendors, who will have a large variety of African fabrics, buttons, beads and conch shells.

Quilters Wanted...

The daughter and son whose Mother died recently would like to have several quilts made to give to their children so they have a memory of their grandmother to accompany photos and stories. It has also been a family tradition that each grandchild receives a quilt. They are looking for someone (or several people) with quilting experience and interest in this project to work with them on the design and do the quilting. The top of the quilts would be made in part from some of the beautiful materials of their Mother's clothing. They would like 4 or 5 queen size quilts made. There is no strong preference for the quilt being hand quilted vs machine quilted.

They have provided a few suggestions as to the design/s of the quilts but are very open to advice. Their thinking was a fairly contemporary design, letting the fabrics and patterns determine the size of the swatch, such that each swatch could be a variety of sizes and shapes. The most important thing to them is really the fabrics themselves, rather than the pattern of the quilt. This might decrease the amount of piecing required to do the more traditional small swatch, pattern intensive designs.

Quilt Show

It's May already. The flowers are out and life is great. It's finally spring.

We hope you are well on your way to completing your entries for the Quilt Show, which takes place September 27 & 28 - not far off now. The entry form can be found on the guild's website. You can either fill it in on your computer and email it to the guild email account (wcqg@wcquiltersguild.on.ca) or fill it in and then print it to hand to either of us (Marg Cassel & Colleen Roberston) at the May or June guild meetings. There will also be copies of the entry form at the Raffle Ticket table for those who do not have Internet access. The deadline for entries is at the June 19, AGM meeting.

As you know, during the month of July photography of all the items in the show will be taking place at the Creative Sisters Quilt Studio. At the June meeting (and hopefully May meeting) you will be able to prebook your appointment. The images are an important aide for the display convener in planning an exhibit that showcases your works to the best advantage. They are also used for the CD that documents the show.

Please be sure to have the 4" sleeve on the back of your quilt by the time photos are taken. The sleeve instructions are on the website and printed copies are at the Raffle Ticket table. Small items that would not be hung do not need a sleeve. If you have any questions on whether a particular item needs a sleeve or not, please contact Kathy Bissett for help.

When you are completing your registration forms, please remember to include any documentation and/or copyright information that relates to the source of your pattern (e.g. name of the book, name of the designer of the quilt pattern, etc.). *THIS IS REQUIRED FOR THE SHOW.* Should you have any questions regarding this, feel free to contact either of us (Colleen or Marg).

Your entry form also provides information for the Program Handbook that the visitors will use during the show. It also confirms that your entry will be in the show. Please ensure that if you have sold or given away something that you entered in our Show, that it is available for the Show.

Please keep selling those Raffle Tickets. Use the photo of the quilt to help you. If you have any suggestions as to where we might do corporate selling please let us know. In 2011 we raised over \$400 at the Sun Life lobby by their cafeteria. We hope to be able to do that again this year. If you have sold your books of tickets, please bring them back early for a draw at the meetings.

Elaine LaRonde is collecting magnets and is ready to send them out to the various quilt shops that you will be visiting before the Show. Please see her for a bundle to take with you when you travel to those shops that are a bit further away. It helps cut costs on shipping, etc. and is a great way to see other quilt shops.

With the warmer weather, we start selling raffle tickets at the St. Jacob Market. Please consider taking a Saturday morning or part of one to enjoy the sights, sounds and wonderful smells of the Market as you talk to people passing by and hopefully sell a few tickets.

We have been invited to take part in the St. Jacobs Quilt Festival Merchants' Mall on May 23 & 24. This provides a wonderful opportunity to display our Raffle Quilt and sell tickets. If you have some time on either of those days, please talk to one of us.

It seems a little early to ask for strawberry jam, but we will be asking for it by September. So, if you like to put jam down, please consider saving some for the Show Tea Room.

Also, as the summer progresses, we will be asking for contributions of good sized quilts for various displays, in libraries and in the RIM rotunda in September.

Taking the Mystery out of the Pioneer Braid


An easy way to construct the traditional Pioneer Braid Quilt is to start with a right angled


Collect 2" x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips of fabric and sort into lights and darks.

Cut a right angled triangle with a base of at least 4" and up to 6" or more. You may wish to have the same fabric for the base to unify this scrappy quilt.

To this triangle sew a dark 2" x 6 1/2" strip.

Then add a light to the other side. Continue adding strips alternating with the darks on one





Continue until you have a braid of the length desired.

Trim off the pointed edges to add sashing between the columns. Then trim the top and bottom of the braid columns.

This traditional pattern can be varied in many ways. A few are:

- * colour arrangement
- * colour scheme
- * strip width

One popular variation is the French Braid. There are patterns available for this contemporary variation of the traditional Pioneer Braid.
