QUILT SHOW 2015

OUTREACH PROGRAMS



The Guild would really like your help in Two Areas

The time has come that we need to better document how many quilts we donate back to the community each year. The Outreach programs have a running total with a steady input from our generous members. We are involved in other community projects on a yearly basis, such as: JSH quilting bees, funds and support for ROOF, funds for Maggie Kaljas, and other cultural events so noted in "Scraps of Wisdom". Also, well known are our generous cash donations to various local charities from the proceeds of our bi-annual quilt show.

However, what is not documented is the yearly input from our members to the Mennonite Relief Sale. We are looking at a 10 year period. We simply need numbers on a confidential basis so that we can report the number of quilts that were donated in that period to the New Hamburg Relief Sale Auction. There may also be unknown donations to other groups such as Victoria Charms and Quilts of Valour. If you have photos of quilts, please submit them.

In a second related area, we would like to have a better handle on our other projects that are currently on display in the community. We are aware of the quilt hanging in the foyer of the

Grand River Hospital Regional Cancer Centre. Marnie Heatley's "Books and Quilts" with Waterloo Public Libraries is another example. We are sure there are other examples out and about. This information needs to be digitized for future use.

- 1) Number of quilts donated to the Mennonite Relief Sale in the last 10 years, or others, and
- 2) Any Quilts projects that are on display in the Community or other areas

Hello again Quilt Guild members! You may recall a newsletter submission last year, or a visit I made to your guild meeting in the spring of this year. I wanted to give you an update and make sure you keep VQC on your radar. We provide quilts to people living with cancer.

As I expected, demand for our quilts grow as we are becoming more well known in this community. We have consistently delivered 12 quilts or more a month for the last six months, however October is showing the growth I anticipated. There are a dedicated group of about 10 quilters/sewers who are producing quilts at a fabulous rate to meet the present demand.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Some specific needs: quilters who can quilt a lap size quilt on a domestic. We can supply the quilt pin basted. Diagonal lines look lovely on a number of different patterns.

Long arm quilters who would volunteer their time and machine to quilt a quilt a month, or a quilt a quarter. The more hands we can get involved the less impact on anyone person. We currently have access to two long arm machines, however, increased access would be a godsend. Quilters who would take a lead role in organizing and running quilt days would be helpful.

OTHER DONATION IDEAS

Some other ways you could help:- donate a top, 50 by 70

- donate a completed quilt, 50 by seventy, batting is required to be 80/20 or 100 percent cotton, and the backing must be flannelette.
- thin out your stash and donate fabric
- cut your scraps into specific sizes and donate the prepared scraps for quilters to create a scrap quilt, contact us for the details of the sizes we use in our common scrap quilts.


Taking the Mystery Out of Moods of the Ocean

The block for this quilt was inspired by Ricky Tims' Convergence Quilts. The instructions are for a single block using two fabrics. While each block is made from two fabrics, the quilt can have made from many different fabrics.






1. From two contrasting fabrics (A and B) cut rectangles 8" by 11" and iron them together.




2. From the rectangles cut strips parallel to the long side of the rectangles. Cut strips the following widths:

1", 1 ¼", 1 ½", 1 ¾", 2 ¼" (There will be a ¼" strip left over)




3. From the left, arrange Fabric A strips in order of width, with starting with the widest one. Leave space for the Fabric B strips.


Next intersperse the Fabric B strips in order of width, with the widest at the right.



4. When sewing the strips alternate the sewing direction as illustrated below.




5. Press the seams and square the block to $10 \frac{1}{2}$ or 11.



6. When assembling the blocks for a quilt, rotate every other block 90 degrees. The illustration above is only a suggestion.







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If you're looking for a reason to purge your linen closet, I'm looking for vintage "whitework" for use in a quilt project. "Whitework" is typically white embroidery on white fabric. It can be on either linen or cotton fabric from tableclothes, pillow cases or towels etc. in reasonable condition. Stains and holes are fine as they will be trimmed off.

These items can also contain fine drawn threadwork or small cutwork, which is fine, but not necessary, however, lace and battenburg are not appropriate for this project. If you're looking for a good home, just let me know or bring them to the guild meeting.
