Presidents' Message

Hello Quilting Friends -

The quilts have been shown, the ribbons for Viewers' Choice presented and all our wonderful volunteers have had a chance to catch their breath and get back to their quilting. I, too have had the time to reflect on our show and some of the information that came out of it.

For example, did you know that only 56 members (or less than one quarter of our membership) entered quilts in the show? I admit to being surprised to learn that. We see so many beautiful quilts at Show and Tell each month, from the whole gamut of our membership, so what happens when it's showtime? Some people have said that members are shy about putting their work in a show with members who are master or competitive quilters. They fear their work will not compare well. But our show is not a competition – it is an exhibit! Quilts are not there for comparison but for inspiration. Each quilt was hung with care and made to look its very best, regardless of the quilt maker's perceived skill. And each one was special – both to the quilt maker and to the viewers who were privileged to visit our show. Our visitors were awed.

As quilt makers, we have no way to gauge what will inspire others. Neither should that be a concern when we choose our projects or when we show them to others. In fact, my favourite quilt at this year's show was not actually in it! I was privileged to meet Vanessa, age 10 who is the great niece of one of our members. Her grandmother had scraps of flannelette from making pyjamas for her grandchildren which Vanessa arranged in a very pleasing pattern for her first quilt. She had machine quilted a grid across the quilt and was just hand tacking the binding to the back. What an inspiration! Her quilt was well designed and will be well loved . Vanessa smiled the whole time she was explaining how much she enjoyed making the quilt. By sharing her joy of quilting, Vanessa was sharing a part of herself with me. That's what makes each quilt unique and valuable – the pieces of themselves that quilt makers show through their work. So, it really doesn't matter whether you are a master quilter or a beginner, you will never know how your quilts and their stories will inspire others if you don't share them.

2013/14 Presidents' Challenge - Playing with Colour

This year's challenge provides a fun way to play with some new colour combinations. To participate, here's all you have to do:

- randomly draw a packaging label from our selection
- use a minimum of 3 colours from the label in your quilt OR make a quilt in a theme based on the label e.g if the label is from a package of marshmallows, you could do a quilt about camping (e.g. s'mores)
- your completed quilt may have a perimeter no larger than 72 inches in total, but it can be any shape you wish
- the quilt and original label must be brought to the June 2014 meeting to be eligible for a participation draw. THERE WILL BE NO JUDGING OF THE QUILTS.

Before the meeting, you can sort scraps yourself or I can do it for you. Coming in November there will be new strips and eye spy scraps.



Opportunity to Join a Block Exchange

Some members have noticed bags of blocks being exchanged on a table during our meetings. These are from a group of members that have joined together to learn piecing techniques, colour recognition, and the importance of exact measuring and sewing. There have been a number of groups over the years that have formed and some are still going behind the scenes where friendships and a quilting community have developed. Some groups have grown too large or shrunk and reformed with others. Some have taken a time off for a number of reasons. Some have enjoyed the exchange and some have not. If you are in for perfection, group exchange might not be your thing. Think unique instead of flawed and you will have fun. I have learned more about colour, exactness of quarter inch seams, proper pressing, creativity and how much potlucks make good bonding of friends. It was far easier to make one tenth of the quilt top and have a variety of materials that would take time and expense to achieve this look if I had done it myself.

If some members would like to start another block exchange (this is different than the strip exchange that you had an opportunity to join last month), I would be glad to help the formation of a group(s) that would start in the new year. This was their grant giving \$1.00 for every \$450 of tape totals that we have added up and sent in to Zehrs for the past many years. We received this grant for our Outreach Programs. All good things come to an end and we are very grateful for the money that Zehrs has given us over the years.

Lynne Fisher started collecting, adding and submitting the tapes around 1998 and I took over in 2008. Our submissions averaged \$500 per year and that is approximately \$8,000 we have received over the years from Zehrs. We are waiting for a cheque of \$600 from Zehrs for the tapes I took in in September.

A big THANK YOU for everyone that have saved their tapes - they did go to a good cause.

Organizing Your Scraps

Tip #1: Cut small squares to use up odd sized scraps (i.e. 1 1/2", 2", 2 1/2", etc). Stack by size in small, labelled boxes.

Tip #2: Do the same as tip #1 with strips by width. Strips can be sewn end to end a la jelly roll style quilts.
